# **New Projects**

We have contacted the CBMIN office in Ontario about the Chagas project which we are looking to get involved in.

The Chagas parasite is found in the homes of the poor who, because of cost, use thatch on their roofs. At night, these bugs come out and bite, infecting people with their feces. This disease has very limited treatment options, and often leads to a shortened life span. For those who live with Chagas, heart disease, and malformation of the intestines is common. Can you imagine putting your children to bed at night knowing what lurks in your home?

It is our hope to help make these Adobe (mud) houses bug proof by providing new roofs and filling all the cracks in the walls as well as providing a concrete floor. This all together costs less than \$500 a house.

I am hoping to arrange a team to visit Bolivia to work on this project; more details to follow in the next few months.

# **Chagas Facts**

Once infected: over the course of many years, serious chronic symptoms can appear, such as heart disease and malformation of the intestines. If untreated, the chronic disease is often fatal. Current drug treatments are generally unsatisfactory; it can shorten the life of a person by up to 15 years.

Chagas disease occurs exclusively in the Americas, particularly in poor, rural areas of Mexico, Central America, and South America. It is estimated that as many as 8 to 11 million people are infected.

As we continue the work in different parts of the world let us pray that God will use this to build his Kingdom.
